

Welcome back to a new semester! We hope that you all are healthy, thriving and enjoying the semester so far.



Ross & Flower Prizes

Now Accepting Submissions

Please consider submitting an essay to the undergraduate competition for the Ross Prize or Flower Prize in Philosophy. The winners of each essay contest will receive a cash prize and have their win announced at Commencement.

Both prizes were established in memory of Philosophy faculty, Professor James F. Ross and Professor Elizabeth Flower respectively. James F. Ross, who worked in history of medieval philosophy, philosophy of religion, philosophy of law, and metaphysics, was a member of the department from 1962 until his death in 2010. Elizabeth F. Flower, who worked in value theory and in the history of philosophy in America, taught at Penn from 1937 to 1985, and was among the first few women to be tenured at a major university.

Now, he uses his training in philosophy and biology to investigate the study of human genetics, and whether there exists any biological racial classification that is useful in medical research.
